New England Direct Primary Care Physicians Converge to Address Revolutionary Medical Movement and Formally Organize

York Harbor, ME- Direct Primary Care physicians representing New England states converged at the Harbor Crest Inn in York Harbor, ME on Saturday to initiate the New England Direct Primary Care Alliance (NEDPCA). For the first time ever, this network of doctors whose medical practices follow the Direct Primary Care model will formally join resources, experience and efforts to promote, organize, and support this revolutionary medical movement that is on the cusp of taking New England, and the country, by storm.

Direct Primary Care (DPC) is a new model of practicing medicine in which the physician works directly with the patient to provide uncompromised medical care. Insurance companies are typically not involved in this model and the number of patients enrolled in each practice are usually limited so that extended time can be spent with patients. Unwanted fee-for-service incentives are replaced with a simple flat fee, thus allowing the physician to care for the patient as they see medically fit. Typically, patients pay monthly/annually for services to include: Guaranteed sameor next-day appointments with their physician, access to discounted medications and lab tests and unprecedented communication with their doctor via cell phone/email 24 hours a day.

Dr. Peter Sacchetti, M.D. of Independent Health Advantage in York, ME is one of the newest physicians to join this medical movement. With opening his new practice in January of 2016, Dr. Sacchetti has become the first DPC Internal Medicine M.D. in the state of Maine and has seen a steady growth in the number of enrolling patients. The doctor attributes that trend to the fact that people are recognizing failures within the system and are looking for alternative models that offer higher quality care.

"Now more than ever, patients are driven to reduce spending and find a physician for their present and future needsone who sticks around. Many of my patients who come in for an appointment can spend about an hour discussing their healthcare concerns in-depth." With the average face-to-face time doctors spend with their patients running 8 minutes, patients of Direct Primary Care practices can benefit from relaxed unrushed visits due to the safe and reasonable patient panel size. "If labs are needed, I can order and conduct the testing on-site with results in about 12 minutes. There's no need to haul over to an off-site lab and wait days for test results. I am able to use my inoffice lab to test and interpret patient samples and immediately discuss the results with them. If needed, I write a prescription and dispense their medication directly from my on-site pharmacy. The convenience of one stop shopping."

Physician dispensing regulations are governed at the state level typically by either the state's pharmacy or medical board(s). In New England, Massachusetts restricts providers from dispensing medicines. However, Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont have no restrictions in place.
